Highlights of Session Meeting held on March 21, 2024

- The following Elders and Church employees have completed "Boundary Training "on March 6, 2024 and have received Certificates of Completion from the Carlisle Presbytery: Elisabeth Gauthier, Elaine Fry, Mike Fry, Tom Hefflefinger, April Messenger, Lynette McCulloch, Hale McCulloch and Clerk of Session Jim Ellingsworth.
- Tom Hefflefinger suggested that we have a challenge presented to the congregation to ask someone to come to worship with us, perhaps on a specific Sunday, idea of Bring Someone to Church; somewhat like a Rally Day. Session thought it was a good idea and this could be done when the Church Picnic is on August 11th at Doubling Gap Park.
- Gail Kunkleman will be hired for the custodian work of SPY
- Dee Den Hartog notified Pastor Vern know that after 2 1/2 years of running the video camera during the Sunday worship, she will no longer be doing so. She feels that she has loyally fulfilled this duty, by alternating with Karyn Cunningham over these past 2 1/2 years. She has let Karyn know and Karyn will fill in as much as she can. This coming week, April Messenger will be running the camera
- Karyn Cunningham will continue running the video with backup from Elisabeth Gauthier and April Messenger until someone to replace Dee volunteers.
- The ending checking account balance as of 2-29-2024 was \$8,171.91. Income for February was \$17,644.51 and the year to date income is \$31,064.98. Expenses for February totaled \$17,872.50 and year to date expenses were \$32,986.75.

- Lynette McCulloch and Nancy McCullough audited the Church Books for 2023 on March 05, 2023 and found everything to be in order.
- Regarding the Church's Library of Music Pastor Vern stated that he would like to see someone in the Congregation to be responsible for maintaining the Music Library, set up the weekly use of the music, etc. It was felt among the Session members that a stipend could be done for this responsibility. Further discussion will continue next month.

Happy Spring Everyone!

As most of you know, we have been using recorded organ files in worship since Ted Krocheski retired as our organist. We have built our digital music library for free due to the ministry of two men who live on different continents.

In Australia there was a man named **Clyde McLennan**, an ordained Baptist Pastor. For 35 years, he served in smaller churches across New South Wales, Victoria and Tasmania. On some occasions he was also the church musician.

As a church organist, Clyde recognized it was often hard to find suitable musicians to play for worship, particularly in small churches, home groups, aged care facilities. So in 2006 he founded the website "Music for Small Churches." He used his talents as a computer programmer and musician to create the Small Church Music website. During his retirement, and before his death in 2022, Clyde recorded almost 15,000 hymns and songs that could be downloaded free to accompany congregational singing.

On the other side of the world from Clyde McLennan, was a man named **Richard Irwin**, an English Organist who created the website "**Hymns Without Words.**" The website is a free service providing high quality recording of hymns for use by congregations and choirs, including on-line services. Unfortunately, Richard passed away on 7th December 2023 after a long and hard-fought battle with cancer.

Most of the Hymns that we sing on Sundays were recorded by Clyde McLennan, with a few supplemented by Richard Irwin. All the music we currently use for Preludes and postludes are from Richard Irwin as well.

I mention these two men, because I believe their ministry which continues even

after their death, says something about the nature of the Church of Jesus Christ.

In the **Apostles Creed** we pray that we believe in "the communion of saints." This phrase expresses the belief that a bond unites believers in Christ across generations, cultures, and denominations. It emphasizes the shared inheritance of faith, the mutual participation in the life of Christ, and the collective identity as members of God's redeemed community. With this communion extending beyond the earthly realm, to those who have died and are with God. Like our brothers in Christ, Clyde and Richard who minister to us even now.

Another example of this communion can be found in the African Palm Crosses we use on Palm Sunday. The Palm crosses are made in eight villages in the Masasi area of southern Tanzania, these being Mpeta, Mlundelunde, Namikunda, Mumbaka, Machombei, Chivirikiti, Makanyama and Marika. While some of us may of heard of the Masasi, I bet none of us have heard of these villages (never mind pronounce them). Yet we support them when we use the crosses they have fashioned as the proceeds go to enriched the lives of those living in these 8 villages.

By the way, this ministry was begun in 1963 by Anglican Priest **Alan Talbot** who died in 2018. Yet, Palm Crosses continue to be sold around the world, with profits used in education and healthcare projects. It is a ministry that connects you, me, Alan, and those in Tanzania who benefit from it. It is a ministry that is just another living example of the phrase "communion of saints."

SESSION SPEAKS APRIL MESSENGER
